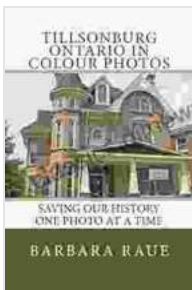


Saving Our History One Photo at a Time: Cruising Ontario '81

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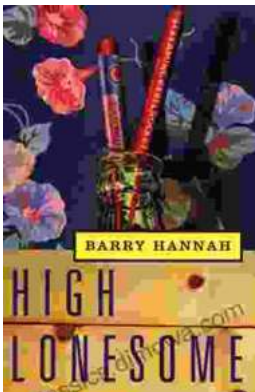
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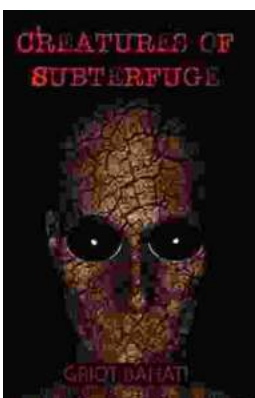


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
